St. Martin of Tours Academy becomes a Fair Trade School!

The Fair Trade Campaign officially recognizes
St. Martin of Tours Academy
for committing to educating students about the issues of Fair
Trade and by sourcing Fair Trade products.

I am sure that you have seen our school and church signage letting you know that we use Fair Trade products. And for the 5th grade fundraiser (for their 6th grade camp), Fair Trade products were sold. By shopping more consciously and choosing to purchase Fair Trade products, we are supporting an international economic system that helps farmers, artisans, and workers lift themselves out of poverty.

Just that alone is a wonderful commitment made by our parish and school. But we did not stop there! Anne Pacheco gathered a committee of administration, staff, parents and children to work on having our school be officially designated as a Fair Trade School.

This is quite a distinction and one that we as a community should be proud to participate in and have acknowledged. When I went to the Fair Trade website, I saw the list of Declared Campaigns that met the required goals to achieve Fair Trade status. There were 21 from US schools, and 5 from California. Having just recently been recognized, St. Martin was number 21 on the list!

Mrs. Dimuzio told me that SMA has been chosen to be on the cover of the Spring edition of the NCEA (National Catholic Education Association) magazine, *Momentum*. In the edition, SMA will be highlighted for being the 1st Fair Trade school in the Diocese, and the first Catholic elementary school in the nation!


The committee students and Anne were recently interviewed by the editor of the La Mesa Courier. Look for the edition to come out next Friday!
